- 6. At our July meeting members of Forthampton WI were treated to a fascinating and informative talk, entitled Kitchen Pharmacy, by medical herbalist, Kamaldeep Sidhu. Her background included shadowing hospital doctors for a year, during which time she was horrified by the lack of nutritional value in food served to patients. Having undertaken 800 hours of clinical training, she set up her own practice in Nailsworth. Her approach is a holistic one and initially she investigates the nutrition, exercise patterns, stress levels and sleep cycles of her patients. Herbs are only recommended if appropriate. We can all grow our own herbs and they are nature's way of building up our immune systems, treating

numerous ailments and applying First Aid. Kamaldeep listed the various systems of the body (cardiovascular, nervous, muscular, respiratory), relating the most appropriate plants for treatment. She also detailed the preparation and application of infusions, tinctures and decoctions. Her advice was that anyone wishing to use herbal medicines should check with their medical practitioner as to whether there would be any conflict with prescription items, and to beware of any toxic parts of plants (e.g. elderflower where only the flowers should be used).

Our next meeting takes place on Tuesday, 11th September, when our speaker will be Peter Preece on the subject *Every Picture Tells a Story*.
